### V. Public Hearing

a. <u>Allowances for Church, School and Public Building Signage</u> <u>Jennifer Ansell</u>

An amendment is proposed to remove Section 152.271, Additional Signs as Special Use, from the Unified Development Ordinance. It is not clear why the requirement to obtain a special use permit exists specifically for church, school, and public building signs as these are typically non-intrusive sign types. Additionally, the amendment would remove the reference to banners, special events signs, etc. as they are addressed under Sections 152.268 and 152.269 of the ordinances.

The amendment would also add language under Section 152.270 to require a sign permit for church, school, and public building (non-governmental) signage, and to establish sign size requirements.

**Planning Board Recommendation:** During its December 7, 2021 regular meeting, the Town of Swansboro Planning Board unanimously recommended approval of the proposed amendments to the Unified Development Ordinance pertaining to church, school and public building signage.

#### **Recommended Action:** 1) Hold the Public Hearing:

2) Motion to approve Ordinance 2022-O1 to amend Section 152.270, Signs Requiring a Permit and Fee, and Section 152.271, Additional Signs as Special Use, of the Unified Development Ordinance as proposed.

Pursuant to NCGS 160D-605, when adopting or rejecting any zoning text or map amendment, the governing board shall approve a brief statement describing whether its action is consistent or inconsistent with an adopted comprehensive plan.

The requirement for a plan consistency statement may also be met by a clear indication in the minutes of the governing board that at the time of action on the amendment the governing board was aware of and considered the planning board's recommendations and any relevant portions of an adopted comprehensive plan.

#### ORDINANCE 2022-O1

#### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE TO CLARIFY THE ALLOWANCES FOR CHURCH, SCHOOL AND PUBLIC BUILDING SIGNAGE

**WHEREAS** North Carolina General Statute 160D-605 requires that zoning regulations shall be made in accordance with a Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS NCGS 160D-605 also states that when adopting or rejecting any zoning text or map amendment, the governing board shall approve a brief statement describing whether its action is consistent or inconsistent with an adopted comprehensive plan; and

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners finds that the proposed text amendment is consistent with the current Comprehensive Plan, specifically the CAMA Land Use Plan, Land Use Compatibility, Create Zoning Standards that Enhance the Function and Appearance of the Gateway Corridor; and Implementation Recommendations and Strategies, Other Community Priorities, Enhance Appearance and Maintain Small Town Coastal Character, and considers the action taken to be reasonable and in the public interest.

**NOW BE IT ORDAINED** by the Town of Swansboro Board of Commissioners that the Unified Development Ordinance is amended as follows:

TITLE XV: LAND USAGE

**CHAPTER 152: UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE** 

#### **SIGNS**

#### § 152.270 SIGNS REQUIRING A PERMIT AND FEE.

No sign can exceed the allowed square footage without a variance.

- (P) Church, School and Public Building (non-governmental) Signs. Shall meet the following criteria:
- (1) Each tract of land shall be permitted one monument sign. See division (G) of this section.
- (2) Signage on the building shall not exceed one square foot per one linear foot of principal building frontage. The square footage permitted can be equally distributed on the site allowing for signage on multiple structures not to exceed the total allotted.

#### **§ 152.271 ADDITIONAL SIGNS AS SPECIAL USE.**

The following types of signs shall be a "special use" in all districts (refer to §§ 152.210 through 152.211).

- A) Signs for churches, schools, or public buildings provided that the sign shall not have more than two sides and the area of each side shall not exceed 32 square feet.
- B) Signs for accessory uses in the kinds of uses described in the immediately preceding subparagraph, provided that the sign is consistent in appearance with the principal sign,

the accessory use sign has no more than two sides, and the area of each side of each accessory use sign shall not exceed 20 square feet.

C) Banners, special event signs, bazaar signs, and temporary signs shall not require a special use permit. These signs will require a permit issued by the Administrator.

#### PLANNING BOARD STATEMENT OF CONSISTENCY

#### Church, School and Public Building Signage

During its December 7, 2021 regular meeting, the Town of Swansboro Planning Board recommended proposed amendments to the Unified Development Ordinance related to church, school and public building signage under Sections 152.270 and 152.271.

This proposed amendment serves to clarify the allowance for church, school and public building signage and is **consistent** with the current Comprehensive Plan, specifically the CAMA Land Use Plan, Land Use Compatibility, Create Zoning Standards that Enhance the Function and Appearance of the Gateway Corridor; and Implementation Recommendations and Strategies, Other Community Priorities, Enhance Appearance and Maintain Small Town Coastal Character, and has been recommended for **approval** by the Planning Board.

#### **Overview:**

At the February 22, 2021, Regular Meeting the Board unanimously adopted the Downtown Traffic Analysis for the following changes to be made effective after the tourist season concluded.

- Front Street would be one-way moving South from NC24 toward Church Street
- Church Street would be one-way moving West from Front Street to Water Street, then two-way to NC24
- Water Street would remain two-way
- Main Street would be two-way from moving East from NC24 to Water Street, then one-way East to Front Street, and two-way across Front Street to the street-end
- Moore Street would remain one-way moving West from Front Street, then East two-way across Front Street to the street-end

After discussion and concerns that arose, it is recommended that Moore Street remain one-way as it is currently.

The Town Code Chapter 74 Traffic Schedules Schedule V. One-Way Streets needs to be updated to reflect these changes and address other wording for conciseness.

**Overview:** The Town has been awarded \$424,000 through the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Fund (ESHPF) Hurricane Disaster Relief for Emmerton School (Old Town Hall) at 502 Church Street. The funds will assist in remaining Hurricane Florence damage repairs and resiliency measures for future events. The grant was established as a 100% reimbursable grant.

However, in reviewing the draft contract it was brought to our attention that preparation of a schematic/design development drawings and construction drawings was not submitted in the application budget and is a federal requirement. The grant agency did say that the cost could be absorbed into the grant award, but it may likely reduce the amount of one or more other items, or the Town could absorb those costs. At the time of memo preparation, a quote for such documents was not available. We hope to have a quote by meeting time. It should also be noted that the application budget provided 2019 cost figures.

#### Funding will provide:

- 1. Tuck Pointing of the interior and exterior bricks to help stop the water penetration that occurs. This would also include the application of a sealant to the exterior brick.
- 2. Repair the extensive damage of the crumbling brick work above the south front door and other interior walls.
- 3. Historic ceiling repair and repainting Even though there is a new roof on the facility, some moisture did seep in sometime after the temporary fixes were installed.
- 4. The installation of a Centralized Dehumidification System
- 5. Window and Door repairs/replacing/storm proofing there are a total of 81 windows and doors that are included in this request.
- 6. Electrical wiring repairs
- 7. Soffit repairs from Hurricane Florence damage
- 8. Sealing the crawl space
- 9. Attic Insulation

#### **Options:**

- 1) Proceed with accepting the \$424,000 so that final contract can be executed and adopt the Grant Project Ordinance as written. As project quotes are received, compare with the budgeted amount. If significant overages are apparent discuss project scope with the Board; or
- 2) Proceed with accepting the \$424,000 and allocate additional funds from the fund balance

Action:			

The listed deadline for completion for this project is September 30, 2023, but we are hoping, due to granting agency delays, that extensions may be available if needed.

**Recommended Action:** 1) Accept the ESHPF Grant in the amount of \$424,000; and 2) Adopt Grant Project Ordinance; and 3) Authorize the Town Manager to take all actions necessary on behalf of the Town to receive the grant funds.

## GRANT PROJECT ORDINANCE EMERGENCY SUPPLEMENTAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUNDS

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Swansboro has been awarded a \$424,000 grant from the North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources for Emmerton School repairs; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town has a project plan for the funding of the Emmerton School Project (old Town Hall at 502 Church Street); and

**WHEREAS**, before receiving a payment, the Board of Commissioners is required to formally accept the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Funds; and

**WHEREAS**, revenue received under the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Fund grant must only be spent for purposes authorized by the North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, any applicable regulations, and in accordance with state law; and

**WHEREAS,** the Town of Swansboro must comply with all applicable budgeting, accounting, contracting, reporting, and other compliance requirements for the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Fund; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Swansboro that we do hereby accept and request Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation funding to be distributed by the State of North Carolina; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Town of Swansboro affirms that the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Funds revenue will only be used for the purposes prescribed in the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Fund grant contract, and any applicable regulations, and in accordance with state law; and

**FURTHER** that, pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the following grant project ordinance is hereby adopted:

**Section 1. Name.** A grant ordinance fund is created, entitled Emmerton School Improvement Project, to carry out significant improvements to Emmerton School.

**Section 2. Revenues.** The following revenues are available for this grant project:

North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources \$424,000

**Section 3. Expenses.** The following amounts are hereby appropriated within the fund for the implementation of the grant ordinance.

Project Cost \$424,000

**Section 4. Effective Date.** This ordinance shall be effective upon its adoption, provided that no expenses shall be incurred in this fund prior to January 10, 2022.
